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
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### Sexual harassment at University of California Libraries: Understanding the experiences of library staff members

A research study conducted to understand how sexual harassment is experienced by non-student employees who work in UC Libraries

### **Objectives**

- Measure sexual harassment experiences quantitatively & qualitatively
- Measure opinions regarding institutional support around sexual harassment
- Determine policy & training recommendations based on this data

### Methods

We developed an anonymous online survey using feedback from an advisory team, campus advocates, & use of existing scales.

579 (36%) of 1610 non-student employees of UC Libraries responded across the 10 campuses.

### **Snapshot of Results**

- of UC Library employees that took the survey have experienced and/or observed sexual harassment
- 63% of respondents who had experienced and/or observed harassment were women
- of exhibitors of sexual harassment behaviors were UC Library staff, followed by members of the public (22%)
  - 74% of people did not report or disclose their sexual harassment experiences

#### Why did so few people report/disclose?

- **41%** Thought it was not egregious enough
- 17% Thought they wouldn't be taken seriously
- **11%** Feared retaliation

### Recommendations

- More training (in-person, bystander, role-play) • Workplace culture change
- Consequences for harassers
- Clear policies & support from leadership
