Conclusion & Impact

- To date, resilience interventions in HPS have focused largely on downstream drivers, ignoring upstream social determinants
- This multidimensional model may guide resilience interventions to better serve students of diverse backgrounds

Theory: Early life stressors and disadvantaged status may adversely affect resilience development in health professions students.
