



Articulating the problem: diversity

- How do we determine which titles in our collections are about "diversity?"
- Can we define "diversity" in a way that makes it easy to retrieve titles from Alma?
- How do we determine "worthiness?," e.g. this title is worth highlighting?
- How do we identify and present the titles in a way that (hopefully) is part of a sustainable workflow that doesn't require huge amounts of effort once the system is in place?



Diversity

Diversity can be defined as the sum of the ways that people are both alike and different. Visible diversity is generally those attributes or characteristics that are external. However, diversity goes beyond the external to internal characteristics that we choose to define as 'invisible' diversity. Invisible diversity includes those characteristics and attributes that are not readily seen. When we recognize, value, and embrace diversity, we are recognizing, valuing, and embracing the uniqueness of each individual. 

- Standardize award names and format
 - All awards end with "award"
- Create Google sheet for award tracking
 - Name of the award, website link, tag, active dates, and subjects
 - Begin with the first prize for each award
- Give students access to community user account "Petra the Anteater"
 - Want all tags created on the same account

Initial Workflow

- Open award website
- Search award winning title in our discovery system (Primo VE)
- If UCI owns title: add "diversity award" tag and award name tag
- If we don't
- Mark on spreadsheet the last year that has been tagged

Unexpected Decisions

- Tag only books we own
- Tag all versions/editions of the winning book? NO
- Tag multiple copies of the same book? NO DECISION
- More lists!
- Create a spreadsheet of award winners not owned to potentially purchase
 - Remove all children's books

- Students ignored assignments
 - Worked on each other's awards mistakes and duplication
- Disorganized spreadsheet
 - Students rarely marked where they left off
 - Students didn't follow the key for the highlight colors




3. Tags are the future!

- Tag Team
 - Goal of evaluating the use of tags in our discovery layer (Primo VE)
 - Variety of different 'beta' projects, of which diversity tagging was the biggest (in terms of titles)
 - Students used a catalog login for a community user (Petra the Anteater) in order to create these tags within Primo/Library Search
 - Each title was assigned two tags:
 - "Diversity Awards"
 - The name of the award


3. Tags are great, but...

- Benefits to this tagging:
 - Democratic
 - Unlimited (as far as we know!) number of tags
 - Easy to view list of all titles
- <u>Problems</u>:
 - hard to delete a tag (needs to go to our Primo administrator);
 - it's hard to gather any stats or collect a list of all award winners;
 - tags can be inconsistent





3. Tags begone

 - Collection Discovery feature in Primo
 - Turned off the tagging




4. Solution 2: Collection Discovery





- Using award information from lists created by Kelsey and her team of students, 586 notes were added to bibliographic records in ALMA
- Discrepancies in award note names and dates were further searched to eliminate mistakes and inaccuracies
- Once bibliographic records were updated with awards notes a note was also added in the OCLC record for each title we have holdings set on and the record upgraded
- Updating each OCLC record makes the note information available to other libraries and enhances the record




From lists to creating a visual collection of Award-winning books in Primo

- Manage collections feature in Alma is used to create a Top-level collection
- Sub-collections are then created
- Discovery thumbnails are selected and the images are visible in the Primo Collections
 Discovery feature
- Currently 15 sub-collections have been created
- Each is listed under the main collection and have a distinct collection URL

Example of Sub-collections in ALMA




Example of Discovery thumbnails in ALMA




Collections in Primo Discovery

Looking back:

- Perfect remote working project!
- We're happy with the solution we've ended up with.
 We're starting to use Collection Discovery for other purposes as well.
- Relying more on the MARC record rather than information that is siloed in Primo feels more comfortable for us.

Ongoing issues:

- Are we spotlighting the right books? Did we identify the correct awards? Did we take a critical look at the lists we're using?
- The project is actually pretty quick and easy. We took a long time getting there, but it could be a remarkably efficient project.
