Thomas R. Aidala, FAIA, has an active professional practice in architecture, urban design, and planning. He was the Principal Architect and Urban Designer, and Principal Design Consultant, for the San Jose Redevelopment Agency (1982-1998) and directed the design program of its \$1.7 billion redevelopment effort and downtown revitalization. In 1996 he was awarded the Thomas Jefferson Award for Public Architecture, the highest national honor given by the American Institute of Architects for design of public architecture.

Jay Claiborne served as the Staff Chairperson, Downtown Streetscape Committee, from 1984-86 with the City of San Jose.
